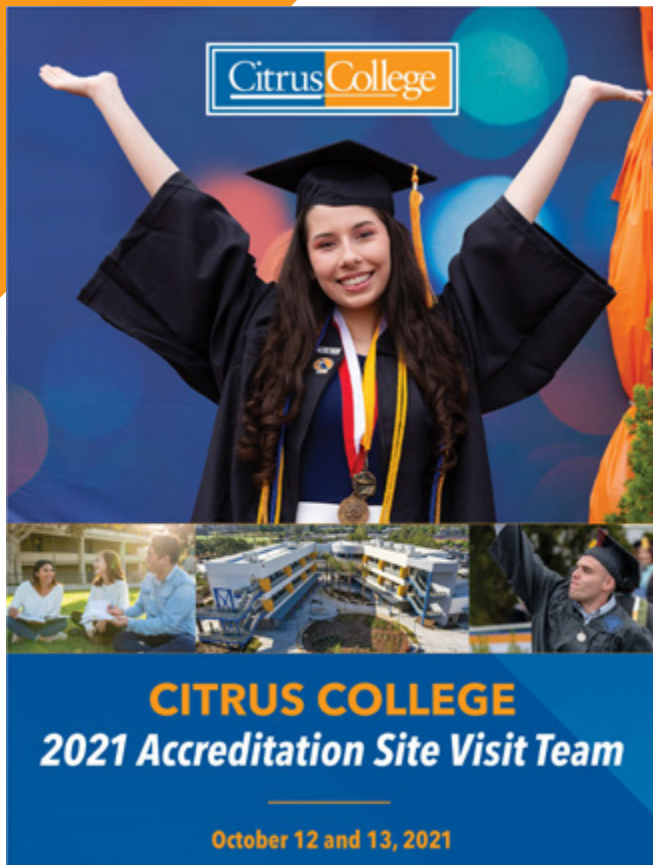

Following a virtual site visit during the fall 2021 semester, Citrus College received news in January 2022 that the ACCJC acted to reaffirm its accreditation.

After nearly two years of self-evaluation and preparation, Citrus College received a vote of full confidence from the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC). During their January 2022 meeting, the ACCJC acted to reaffirm the college's accreditation for seven years, which is the best possible outcome an institution can receive.

"This has been a collective effort, and we are very proud of these impressive results," said Dr. Greg Schulz, superintendent/president of Citrus College.

The committee's decision was made following a review of the college's Institutional Self Evaluation Report (ISER), evidentiary materials and a Peer Team Report that was developed following a virtual site visit in October 2021. The site visit itself was unique in that Citrus College was one of just three institutions that participated in an ACCJC pilot program for the new formative/summative method of accreditation.

As part of this new method, the college's ISER was sent to the members of the visiting team prior to the virtual site visit. Comprised of peers from other community colleges, the visiting team developed lines of inquiry regarding any items needing further clarification. Citrus College then had the opportunity to address these lines of inquiry prior to the visit.

"You all boldly went where others had not yet gone, and we really appreciated that," said Sunita "Sunny" Cooke, Ph.D., chair of the ACCJC visiting team, during the virtual site visit. "The team was very impressed with the involvement of folks across the college in the planning and work of the college, as well as in the approach to accreditation. It was clear that this was a very inclusive process, and that this is a very inclusive and collaborative campus."

In their letter to the college, the ACCJC listed no compliance requirements. The commission also commended Citrus College for the "diligent work and thoughtful reflection" it invested into the review process. As such, the college will not need to take any additional action until October 2025, at which time a midterm report will need to be submitted.

"Reaffirmation is an outstanding accomplishment that was facilitated by the hard work and diligence of more than 80 members of the campus community who contributed to the self-evaluation process," Superintendent/President Schulz added.

DEI

PROGRESS MADE TOWARD DEI GOALS

Since June 2020, the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Task Force has worked to ensure that Citrus College provides a welcoming and inclusive environment for students, employees and the community. During the 2021-2022 academic year, several developments helped advance this mission.

First, Citrus College joined the California Community College Equity Leadership Alliance, hosted by the University of Southern California (USC). This program uses a three-pronged approach to help colleges learn how to better address the concerns of students and employees of color. In addition, the Citrus College Faculty Learning Institute, a professional development committee, launched a workshop series hosted by Lasana O. Hotep, an educator and entrepreneur, that focused on DEI topics, opportunities and conversations.

New DEI Director Tysha Thomas joined the campus community in April, and her primary responsibility is to advise the campus community on issues pertaining to DEI. "I understand the importance of the work ahead of me and believe the best way to succeed is together toward a shared vision," Thomas said when she was hired.

Another DEI highlight this year was the implementation of NameCoach. Embedded in the college's learning management system and Microsoft 365, NameCoach allows users to record their names and indicate their pronouns. Using NameCoach helps faculty and staff build rapport with students in the classroom and on campus, enhancing their sense of belonging through proper recognition.

Finally, two surveys were disseminated near the end of the spring semester that were designed to help Citrus College learn more about the needs of students and employees. The purpose of the surveys is to provide a deeper understanding of the student and employee experience at the college.

In the upcoming year, the results of the two surveys will be analyzed and the DEI director will collaborate with the campus community to scale up initiatives and activities that will further improve DEI on campus.

Citrus College will continue to ensure that it is in alignment with its peer institutions and the California Community College Chancellor's Office in prioritizing and infusing DEI review and practice.

A college administrator with more than two decades of leadership experience, Greg Schulz, Ed.D., became the eighth superintendent/president in Citrus College history on July 1, 2021.

Dr. Schulz arrived after serving six years as president of Fullerton College. Prior to that position, he worked in a variety of other educational leadership roles, including provost of North Orange Continuing Education (NOCE); dean of trades and industrial technologies at Long Beach City College; and dean of instruction and student services of NOCE.

Known for being an enthusiastic and student-centered administrator, Dr. Schulz presided over many campus-wide accomplishments during his first year, including the return of more students and staff to campus; resumption of in-person events; and the hiring of many new faces.

Soon after arriving, Dr. Schulz utilized different approaches to engage the campus community. Not only did he host open office hours, where he met with individuals on Zoom to discuss a variety of topics, he also created an Instagram account (@citrusuptpres). For Dr. Schulz, social media

became a platform where he could share campus updates and highlight students, faculty and staff.

In both fall and spring, Dr. Schulz, an enthusiastic sports fan, attended many Owls games and met dozens of scholar athletes. He also stepped on the field and court several times to throw out a first pitch or shoot hoops. After he sank a free throw attempt early in his first year, the men's basketball team erupted in applause.

As superintendent/president, Dr. Schulz oversaw many virtual and in-person events, including Convocation; Saluting Our Veterans; FLEX Day; the 59th annual Achievement Awards ceremony; a tenured faculty and retirees reception; and commencement. In addition, he also spent time giving presentations at community events, such as the Glendora State of the Schools, Glendora Rotary and Claremont Kiwanis.

"I am so thrilled to be a part of the Citrus College family," Dr. Schulz said. "It has been an honor getting to meet so many students, faculty and staff. As a campus community, we were able to accomplish many wonderful things together during the 2021-2022 academic year. I cannot wait to see what the future holds."



IN MEMORIAM: Dr. Louis E. Zellers (1934-2022)

The campus community was saddened to learn that Dr. Louis E. Zellers, former superintendent/president of Citrus College, had passed away in early June 2022.

Dr. Zellers first joined the campus community in June 1985, when the Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees named him the fifth superintendent/president. A former business and economics instructor, he taught at Boise Junior College and Clark College in Idaho before stepping into community college administrative roles. Immediately prior to joining the Citrus College community, Dr. Zellers served as president of Modesto Junior College.

During a tenure marked by significant change, Dr. Zellers was committed to increasing diversity on campus and spearheaded successful efforts to reach

out to underrepresented communities. He also actively encouraged the recruitment of new faculty and staff from diverse backgrounds.

Under his leadership, Citrus College extended the programs and services it offered to students with disabilities beyond those required by state and federal mandates. He actively sought and received funding that allowed the institution to improve accessibility in all campus buildings, and he established an adapted physical education facility.

Dedicated to increasing access to new technology, Dr. Zellers initiated the addition of fiber optics on campus, which enabled the college to expand telecommunication, link to the internet and offer distance education classes. He also oversaw the opening

of a data processing center and made sure that Citrus College's curriculum evolved with the times to reflect emerging technologies.

After 18 years of service, Dr. Zellers announced his retirement in 2003, marking the end of an era of impressive progress and growth at Citrus College.

"Dr. Zellers was an esteemed and innovative leader who achieved much success during the nearly two decades he served at the helm of Citrus College," said Dr. Greg Schulz, superintendent/president of Citrus College. "His many contributions transformed our campus, as well as our surrounding communities, and his impact remains evident to this day."

SAFELY RESUMING IN-PERSON ACTIVITIES

After operating remotely for more than a year, the Citrus College campus sprang back to life during the 2021-2022 academic year as more students and employees returned and face-to-face events resumed.

Classified staff, supervisors and managers returned in August 2021. To reduce the spread of COVID-19, everyone on campus was required to follow several safety measures, including daily self-assessments for COVID-19-related symptoms; location check-ins on the CitrusMobile app while on campus; mandatory weekly COVID-19 testing; and the use of masks when inside campus facilities.

In September, in-person theater productions returned when the college's theatre arts program held three outdoor performances of Thornton Wilder's Pulitzer Prize-winning drama, "Our Town."

"It was done as an 'under the stars' experience, so that the actors and audience could be maskless," said John Vaughan, dean of visual and performing arts. "There were over 30 people involved in the performance. We used to do outdoor theater

many years ago, but this is the first one in at least 10 years."

After "Our Town," more performances were held on campus. In addition to annual productions like "Christmas Is...," the Haugh Performing Arts Center hosted concerts from a few world-famous artists, including the Righteous Brothers.

The 2021-2022 academic year was also a terrific year for athletics, with scholar athletes competing for the first time since the campus closed in March 2020.

One of the year's most impressive seasons involved the men's basketball team, which reached the California Community College Athletic Association (CCCCAA) state quarterfinals. Though the team lost in the tournament to West Valley College, they finished the season with an impressive 23-7 record. Against fellow Western State Conference teams, the Owls posted a 12-2 record.

Many other events were held on campus through the rest of the spring 2022 semester. The year concluded with the 106th annual commencement ceremony on June 18, 2022.

Black Scholars program provides support

Launched in 2021, the Black Scholars program aims to reach all members of the Black community at Citrus College. It promotes Black excellence and works to establish a sense of belonging on campus through cultural events and community-building activities. The program also offers counseling and advisement, mentorship opportunities and more. Thirty-eight students were part of the Black Scholars program during the 2021-2022 academic year.

College recognized for supporting arts

In August 2021, Arts Schools Network presented Citrus College with the Higher Education Award, which is given to educational institutions or partnership programs that promote arts education in K-12 schools. The college was praised for its partnership with the California School of the Arts - San Gabriel Valley, one of nine local high schools where students can enroll in college-level courses. By taking these courses, students can earn both high school and college credit - free of charge!





Automotive instructor earns two honors

A Citrus College alumnus and full-time faculty member since 2012, Mariano Rubio received two awards during the 2021-2022 academic year. In September 2021, Rubio earned a \$2,000 loan forgiveness award from the Specialty Equipment Market Association Memorial Scholarship Fund. A few months later, he was named the Cengage/ASE Master Automobile Technician of the Year. He was honored for having the highest cumulative automotive technician certification scores.

Study abroad receives honor

In October 2021, the U.S. Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, in collaboration with the Institute of International Education, recognized higher education institutions that generated the greatest number of Gilman scholars from 2001-2021. The highly-competitive Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship program provides funds to outstanding students. Citrus College was one of 20 colleges in the associate degree-granting institution category that was named a "20-year Gilman Top Producer."

In December 2021, instructor Dan Volonte received a University Resident Theatre Association (URTA) Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Training. The award is given to individuals whose students show skill and professionalism in presentation and preparation at URTA auditions. Volonte is the head of tech and design for the college's emerging theatre technologies program, which is only one of two programs in the nation that trains students in concert touring.



Employee honored during veterans' event

Barry Kuan, admissions and records coordinator, was named the Citrus College Saluting Our Veterans honoree in November 2021. Kuan, who joined the Citrus College community in 2013, served in the U.S. Marine Corps for 5-1/2 years. Co-hosted by Citrus College and Azusa Pacific University, the 16th annual Saluting Our Veterans celebration honored local heroes who served in the armed forces.



College scores 'Equity Champion' honors

The Campaign for College Opportunity presented Citrus College with an Equity Champion of Higher Education Award in November 2021. The organization honored colleges in four categories: excellence in transfer, excellence in transfer for Black and Latinx students, excellence in transfer for Black students, and excellence in transfer for Latinx students.



Scholar Baller athletes eclipse previous numbers

One-hundred-and-fifty scholar athletes broke an institutional record in February 2022 when they became the largest group of Scholar Ballers in Citrus College history. A national initiative that seeks to bridge the gap between education and sports, the Scholar Baller program was first introduced on campus during the 2007-2008 academic year. To qualify, a student must maintain a GPA of 3.0 or higher.





New football coach hired

After an extensive search, Brandon Hayashi was selected to lead the Citrus College football team in February 2022. He previously served as the team's interim head coach during the 2021 season. A former Citrus College scholar athlete and graduate of Montana State University, Hayashi has a passion for community college athletics and is looking forward to guiding the team to a winning record.

College mascot redesigned

Hootie has a new look! Thanks to the Citrus College Student Affairs Division, the college's beloved mascot received a makeover. The process began in August 2021, when student affairs contacted Street Characters, Inc. Over the next several months, the mascot solutions company helped student affairs turn their vision of a modern mascot into reality. The new and improved Hootie debuted in February 2022.



Mobile food pantry returns

After two years of decreased visits due to COVID-19, the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank's mobile food pantry returned to Citrus College in March 2022. Employees and student volunteers helped distribute a variety of nutritional items to those in need. In fact, more than 100,000 pounds of food have been distributed since the mobile food pantry's first visit in 2017.



College hosts Men of Color conference

Held in the Campus Center in March 2022, the second Men of Color conference drew more than 40 attendees with the goal of connecting students with faculty and staff mentors. The first Men of Color conference to be held in-person, the theme for the event was "Engage, Empower, Elevate." During the three-hour conference, students heard guest speakers and connected with other program members.



Men's basketball team makes playoffs

The Citrus College men's basketball team capped off its extraordinary 2021-2022 season with an appearance in the California Community College Athletics Association (CCCCAA) state quarterfinals in March 2022. Though the Fighting Owls put up a strong fight, they ultimately lost to West Valley College by a score of 79-68. With the loss, the team finished with a 23-7 overall record. Since the 2006-2007 season, the team has been to 15 consecutive postseasons.



College leads the way in military support

In March 2022, Citrus College earned its 12th consecutive Military Friendly School designation from VIQORY. The college was one of only 282 colleges and universities in the nation to be granted gold award status, which is reserved for top institutions that have leading practices and effective programs. A few months earlier, Citrus College was ranked as a "Best for Vets" college for the first time. Military Times ranked Citrus College fourth among the western region's community colleges.



College hosts GradFest

Citrus College connected graduating students with key resources during the inaugural GradFest, which was held from March 28 to April 1, 2022. Students were able to purchase their cap and gown, attend a transfer conference and receive assistance on their graduation application. Participating student services programs and departments included admissions and records, Associated Students of Citrus College, CalWORKs, the Career/Transfer Center, counseling and advising, DSPS, EOPS/CARE, the International Student Center, school relations and outreach, and the Veterans Success Center.



The Range at Citrus reopens

After being closed for two years due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Range at Citrus reopened to the public in April 2022. The center features two hitting surfaces, including natural grass and mats; 31 tees; a chipping area with a bunker; and a 2,500-square-foot putting/chipping green. Frequently used by students, instructors and employees, the Range hosts golf instruction and practices for the men's golf team.

Five projects produced by the Citrus College Communications and External Relations Office received top honors from the Community College Public Relations Organization in April 2022. Both the college's vaccine champion sticker and a news release about a 72-year-old graduate earned gold. Board mourns trustee passing, welcomes new member

A year after welcoming three new board members, the Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees experienced more change during the 2021-2022 academic year with the passing of Edward C. Ortell, J.D., and subsequent appointment of Cheryl Alexander.

Dr. Ortell, who was first elected to the board of trustees in 1969, passed away on Oct. 16, 2021, at the age of 82. An ardent supporter of community colleges, Dr. Ortell represented trustee area 3, which includes Duarte and portions of Azusa, Monrovia, Arcadia, Covina and Irwindale. In 2020, he was honored for being the longest-serving community college trustee in the state of California.

"For more than 50 years, Dr. Ortell advocated on behalf of all community colleges and was instrumental in helping promote significant initiatives at Citrus College," said Dr. Patricia A. Rasmussen, then-president of the Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees. "I served alongside Dr. Ortell since 2007, and I will always remember him for his passion, devotion and commitment."

As a trustee, Dr. Ortell held all board offices and served more than 10 terms as board president. He also served on several other boards and associations, including the California Community College Trustees Board, the California Master Plan for Education Task Force and the Los Angeles County School Trustees Association.

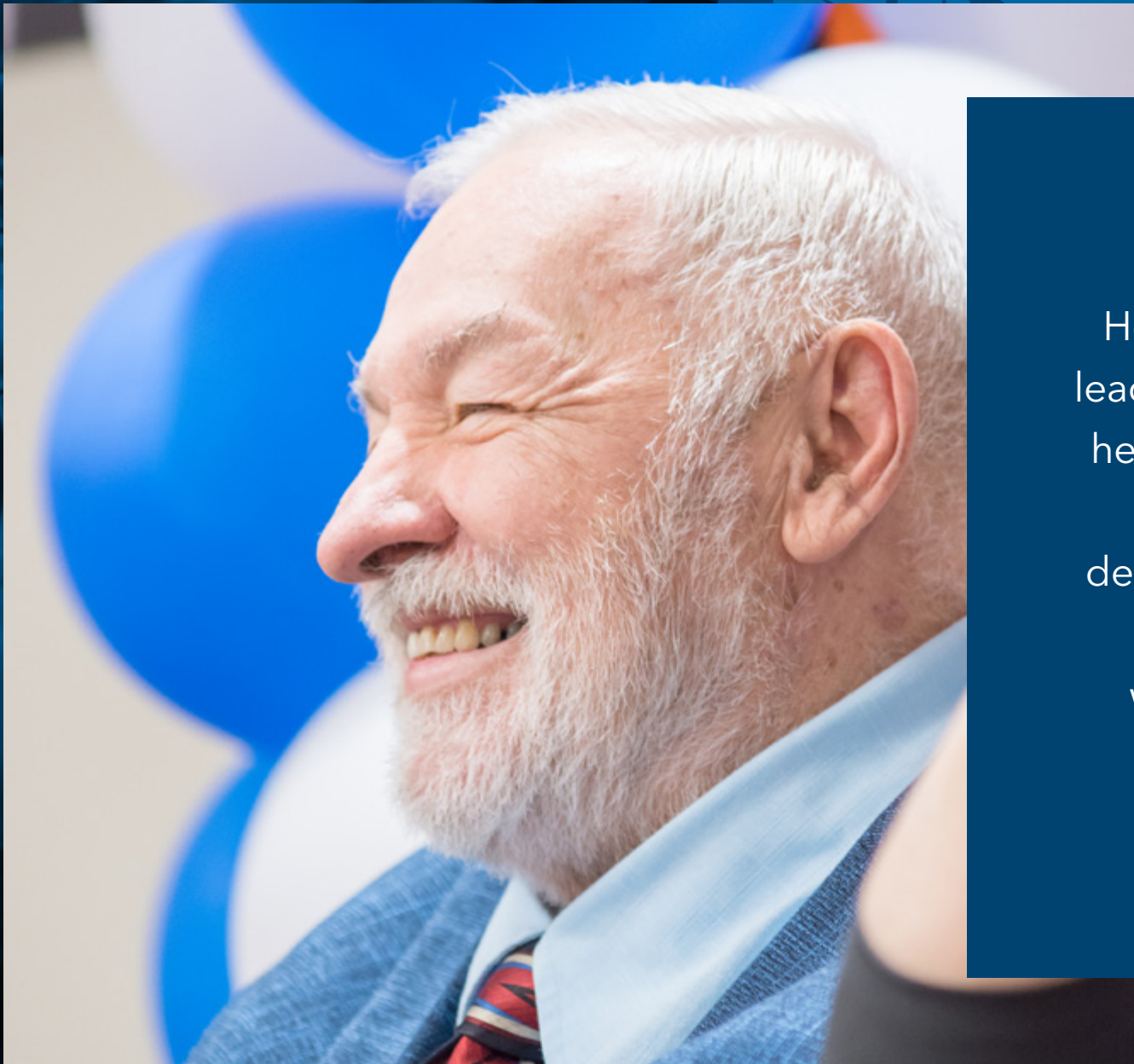
Dr. Ortell was also a professor emeritus of business and computer technology at Pasadena City College. He authored two college textbooks on mathematics and received multiple National Science Foundation grants.

"He was a visionary leader who expertly helped the college navigate five decades of change and innovation with passion and enthusiasm," Dr. Greg Schulz, superintendent/president of Citrus College, said after his passing. "A community college graduate himself, Dr. Ortell was a tireless champion of higher education and fiercely believed in the transformative power of community colleges."

In December 2021, the board of trustees unanimously voted to appoint Cheryl Alexander as the provisional trustee for area 3.

A Duarte resident, Trustee Alexander works as a special education resource specialist teacher in the Inglewood Unified School District. Prior to obtaining that position, she worked as a first-grade teacher and eighth-grade reading intervention teacher for the same district. She also spent time as a computer programmer and system analysis engineer.

Trustee Alexander obtained a bachelor's degree in elementary and special education from Eastern Illinois University. She also earned a bachelor's degree in computer science from Roosevelt University before receiving a master's degree in teaching, with a specialization in reading, from National University. She is currently pursuing a Doctor of Education in Organizational Leadership/Special Education from Grand Canyon University.

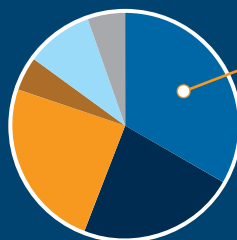

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

SAM PEDROZA

Sam Pedroza, a community leader who served three terms on the Claremont City Council, was selected to receive the 2022 Distinguished Alumni Award.

A lifelong resident of the San Gabriel Valley, Pedroza attended Citrus College in the late 1980s before embarking on a career in public affairs. Currently, he is the assistant city manager for the City of Industry and serves on the Foothill Transit and the San Gabriel Valley Economic Partnership boards.

The eldest of three, Pedroza grew up in Bassett, an unincorporated community near La Puente and City of Industry. In 1986, Pedroza graduated from Bassett High School. He then attended Rio Hondo College, Mt. San Antonio College and Citrus College. While at Citrus, he enjoyed spending time at the student center and taking a writing class, where he said he began to focus on current events and politics.

In 1990, he earned a Bachelor of Arts in Public Administration from San Diego State University. Four years later, he received a Master of Arts in Urban Planning from the University of California, Los Angeles.

Over the next few decades, Pedroza worked in public affairs for the Upper San Gabriel Valley Municipal Water District, San Gabriel Basin Water Quality Authority and Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts. While employed at these agencies, he developed and taught an online course in water politics at Citrus College.

In 2007, he won a seat on the Claremont City Council. Over the course of his three terms, Pedroza twice served as mayor, as well as on the boards of several organizations.

In his current role in the City of Industry, Pedroza is responsible for the development and implementation of the city's communication strategy and objectives. He and his wife, Julie, live in Claremont and have two grown sons, Zachary and Nicholas.



VERONICA KIRTON



Veronica Kirton, a Monrovia resident who accomplished her lifelong dream of graduating from college at the age of 72, was selected to receive the 2022 Distinguished Alumni Award.

Kirton earned an Associate of Arts for Transfer in Sociology in June 2020, two years after she enrolled at Citrus College. Her journey was chronicled in a college press release and led to her and her family, including daughter and Citrus College alumna Ronnese Glover, appearing in a college advertisement promoting enrollment.

Born and raised in New Orleans, Kirton grew up as the oldest of 11 children. Dreaming about going to college since she was in middle school, Kirton enrolled at Delgado Community College in 1965. Ultimately, her plans to finish college were put on hold due to increasing family and work commitments.

Over the years, she worked as a telephone operator for South Central Bell, event coordinator at the California Institute of Technology, and director of family, marriage and ministerial care at Covenant Life Ministries International.

Kirton's return to college to earn an associate degree came after her daughter – Glover – earned her bachelor's degree. At the time, Kirton urged Glover to continue her education and pursue a

master's degree. So, the two of them ultimately made an agreement: if Glover started a master's degree program, Kirton would enroll at Citrus College.

Kirton chose to major in sociology because she was interested in learning about people and had a passion for children and the elderly. Some of her accomplishments at Citrus College included being on the Dean's List for the fall 2019 semester with a 3.7 GPA and receiving an award from the Citrus College Foundation.

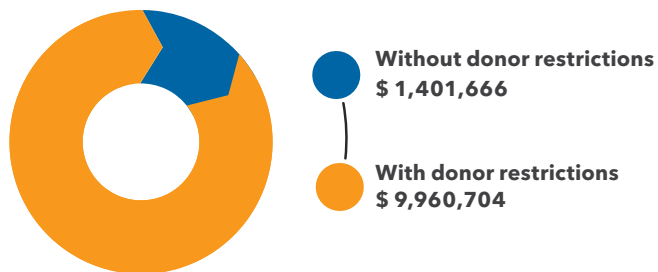
