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Citrus College participated in a statewide study, in which the Research and Planning (RP) Group surveyed more than 7,000 Black/African American students about their transfer experiences. Here are some highlights from the statewide results, as well as our local findings.

At Citrus College, Black students who frequently met with a counselor are more likely to attempt transfer-level math and English. Completion of both subjects is more likely for students who experience less microaggressions at the college.

Statewide, Black students' chances of being transfer-ready increase by **310%** when they complete both transfer-level math and English courses in their first year.

When asked to give one piece of advice to colleges looking to support Black/African American students as they navigate the transfer process, our students said...

To community colleges, provide your Black/
African American students with more community spaces, whether they be study spaces or talks from Black individuals already in their fields of study.

Listen, understand, and have a positive and honest outlook when communicating.

Provide support and encouragement. Offer services that individuals of color can benefit from and feel motivated by.
