DEIA+

Citrus College continues to make strides toward developing culture of DEIA+

Throughout the 2022-2023 academic year, Citrus College continued its efforts to provide students with an environment that empowers them to succeed. Much of this work has occurred in the area of diversity, equity, inclusion and accessibility, also known as DEIA+. Committed to embedding DEIA+ principles in all areas of the campus, the college moved forward with several projects designed to provide insight and guidance into the needs of students and employees.

One such project involved surveying the campus community. At the end of the previous academic year, Citrus College disseminated two DEI surveys - one to students and one to employees. The goal of these surveys was to provide a deeper understanding of the student and employee experience at the college. This year, the results of those surveys were compiled, analyzed and shared.

During the spring 2023 semester, the college hosted four DEIA+ sessions, where attendees - both in-person and on Zoom - reviewed the DEI survey reports. During these "Donuts and Data" sessions, Ty Thomas, DEI director, and Dr. Lan Hao, director of institutional research, planning and



effectiveness, discussed the findings and listened to feedback. The results from the surveys will be taken into consideration as the college continues to develop actionable strategies for improvement.

Additional information-gathering activities that took place during the spring 2023 semester were equity walks. Aimed at identifying areas where the college can become more inclusive, equity walks had members of the campus community exploring the campus with the goal of taking notes and photos related to messaging and accessibility.

After being divided into groups, participants spent a few hours visiting different locations on campus. When the walks were over, the groups reconvened and discussed their findings. Following these walks in March 2023 and May 2023, participants suggested adding diverse pictures, artwork and stories throughout campus, as well as providing additional signage to inform students about available resources.

Another major DEIA+ development was the completion of the USC Race and Equity Center's Hiring Institute. Thirty Citrus College employees completed the institute, which consisted of six equity-focused professional development workshops over a period of six weeks. Using a three-pronged approach, the program worked to help the college learn how to better address the concerns of students and employees of color.

Each of the institute's virtual, three-hour workshops were structured to build the capacity of Citrus College leaders to review and develop a hiring plan that is DEIA+ focused. Participants learned to recognize and interpret hiring data, lead race-conscious and equityminded discussions, use inquiry protocols to examine institutional certificates of practice, and more.

One final highlight from the 2022-2023 academic year was the adoption of the Citrus College land acknowledgement statement. Developed in alignment with recommendations from the California Community College Chancellor's Office, the statement will be used at large gatherings where the entire campus community comes together. It will also be used for special occasions, such as ground-breaking ceremonies, ribbon-cutting events and end-of-the-year celebrations, including commencement.

With DEIA+ at the forefront of college planning and decision-making, much more progress can be expected in the years ahead. "It's inspiring to see employees and students from all parts of the college come together to identify opportunities, share ideas and set the path for the future," Thomas said.



Expanded mental health services help students overcome challenges

Knowing that academic success and wellness go hand in hand, Citrus College has made great strides toward making students feel welcome and safe on campus. Enhancements to the college's mental health services have been particularly impactful, with hundreds of students receiving assistance and developing skills that will help them throughout their academic journeys.

One of the most significant changes to the mental health services offered by Citrus College has been

the introduction of the college's first mental health supervisor. Joining the campus in July 2022, Nadine Henley, LCSW, is responsible for providing direct mental health services to students.

According to Henley, receiving preventative care and early intervention services can help students reduce symptoms and behaviors connected to depression, anxiety, stress, managing interpersonal relationships and navigating academic workload. Under her leadership,

the college's mental health team provides registered students with up to eight one-on-one sessions with a mental health professional per semester.

"We offer in-person and Zoom appointments, as we know we have students who are working and we want to remove barriers to utilizing the service," she said. "We make community referrals where appropriate and aid students in being proactive verses reactive regarding their mental health."



Student athletes enjoy winning

seasons

From football and basketball to soccer and cross country, Citrus College Athletics had an incredible year, both on and off the field.

One of the year's biggest highlights came when the football team, led by head football coach Brandon Hayashi, won the American Division Championship and finished the season with an 11-0 record. In addition, the team won its first conference championship since 2006.

After the season, a record number of students earned American Metro League accolades. Other honors included Hayashi being named Coach of the Year and defensive lineman Luke Pruitt. who tragically passed away in a traffic accident in October 2022, being honored as the Honorary Defensive Player of the Year.

The women's soccer team also earned a postseason berth for the sixth time in the past seven years, while the men's and women's water polo teams both appeared in the Western State Conference Tournament, with the men's team taking third place.

The men's and women's cross country teams had successful seasons too, as both teams qualified for the SoCal Championships. Additionally, the women's golf team qualified four student athletes for the SoCal Championships.

During the spring semester, the men's basketball team excelled in the California Community College Athletic Association State Championship Tournament and finished among the top four teams in the state. Although the Owls didn't advance to the championship game, they still had one of their most successful seasons in the program's history, with a 28-4 record and their fifth conference championship in the past six seasons.

Also, men's golfer Kabir Chadha qualified for the state championship during the spring semester and took 18th place with a final score of 164.

Near the end of the academic year as part of the Scholar Ballers celebration, the college honored 142 student athletes who maintained a GPA of at least 3.0. The celebration took place before a home softball game against Glendale Community College on April 13.

"On behalf of the entire campus community, I congratulate each of our scholar athletes across all sports on the incredible job they have done on the field and in the classroom," said Superintendent/President Schulz. "We are so proud of your achievements and for inspiring us all."



Building a brighter







Citrus College Architecture Club students rose to the challenge this year by working with local groups to build a solar-powered mobile shower for those experiencing homelessness and housing insecurity.

The students became involved in the effort after architecture instructor Tommy Reyes learned about the project through Dr. Sam Landsberger, a friend and mentor at California State University, Los Angeles (Cal State LA).

"I saw immediately that this project had a host of layers that would benefit our students here at Citrus College," Reyes said. "I realized this was my chance to show students how to design and build a project that also gives back to an underserved community."

In the spring, students began converting a trailer, which was originally meant for hauling off-road vehicles, into

a mobile shower. In collaboration with Cal State LA and Hillside LA, a church in Los Angeles, the students spent countless weekend hours working on the project at a volunteer's home in Yorba Linda.

By the end of the 2022-2023 academic year, the group put the finishing touches on the trailer as they prepared to take it to help communities in Orange County. Around this time, reporters from ABC7 and the San Gabriel Valley Tribune observed the construction, interviewed volunteers and published articles and videos about the project.

In addition to helping a community in need, the project was also a learning experience for the students. One key aspect of the project was its sustainability.

The water used in the showers is stored in a tank that is heated by the sun as much as possible. To heat the

water further, the shower used an electric water heater powered by solar panels and batteries. When not in use, the solar panels recharged the batteries.

For Reyes, the experience of working on the project showed what architecture and engineering can achieve.

"I want [the Citrus College students] to know that they can help solve a lot of our current problems when it comes to climate change, homelessness and other problems we have in Southern California," Reyes said. "We can be the change we would like to see, and we can be the change we need as a society and give back."

Citrus College scores big at honors society



Three members of the Citrus College community were celebrated at a conference hosted by the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) international honor society in April 2023. Jessie San, student leader and president of the college's Beta Nu Eta chapter of PTK; Areej Qasqas, adjunct faculty member and Beta Nu Eta advisor; and Dr. Greg Schulz, superintendent/ president of Citrus College, were honored during Catalyst, the annual PTK convention.

A Citrus College psychology major, San was among 2,400 high-achieving community college students nominated to this year's All-USA Academic Team. As a result of her All-USA competition scores, she was named a Coca-Cola Academic Team Gold Scholar. San was also one of only eight students to be recognized by the international organization as Guistwhite Scholarship recipients.

Similarly, Qasqas was one of a select few who were presented with a 2023 Paragon Award for New Advisor. To be nominated for the award, advisors must have less than four years of service, make significant contributions to the growth of individual members, serve as the chapter's advocate on campus and encourage chapter involvement. In addition, Superintendent/President Schulz was one of only 28 individuals to be presented with a Paragon Award for New Presidents.

Rounding out the college's conference success were several chapter awards, including being named the second-most distinguished chapter of the Nevada/ California region, being recognized as a 2023 PTK 5 Star Chapter, being included among the Top 100 Chapter list and receiving a Distinguished College Project award. Beta Nu Eta was one of the top 41 out of 1,300 chapters that were internationally recognized for their service and research work.

Study abroad program returns

After several trips were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, students from Citrus College and the Southern California Foothills Consortium resumed studying abroad during the 2022-2023 academic year.

The fall program took place in London, where students studied psychology and explored the U.K. and Europe.

"It is fitting that our first program abroad since spring 2020 was in London, the site of the very first Citrus College study abroad program in 1989," said John Morris, study abroad specialist.

In the winter, students traveled to Paris to learn about anthropology and history. While in France, the group visited the Louvre Museum, Mont-Saint-Michel, the beaches of Normandy, and many other cultural and educationally significant locations.

In the spring, the group journeyed to Madrid and immersed themselves in Spanish culture. While there, they spent time in El Retiro Park and viewed remarkable artwork, including Bosch's "The Garden of Earthly Delights," which is located in the Museo Nacional del Prado.

Distinguished Faculty



Tasha VanHorn

Tasha VanHorn, a full-time speech instructor and distance education pioneer who taught at Citrus College for 25 years, was the 2023 recipient of the Citrus College Distinguished Faculty Award.

VanHorn, who retired in 2023, made a significant impact in the Citrus College Language Arts and Library Division. In addition to developing online and honors public speaking courses, she also founded the Citrus College Speech Club and successfully advocated for free speech tutors and the development of the Citrus College Speech Lab.

As an instructor, VanHorn sought to engage students by making course content relevant to their daily lives. For example, she designed informative speech assignments to be an opportunity for students

to research their dream careers. She also encouraged students to research congressional bills for their persuasive speech assignments in order to learn more about the legislative process. To that end, VanHorn took pride in having motivated and empowered students to become more politically active.

To make classes fun and reduce the anxiety surrounding giving speeches, VanHorn brought in coloring projects and started each lesson with a "song-of-the-day."

VanHorn's contributions to Citrus College also extended beyond the classroom. Over the years, she participated in numerous academic panels and presentations, served in many leadership roles, and received various awards, including the 2007 Outstanding Community

College Educator of the Year from the National Communication Association, VanHorn was also a nationally published communications scholar.

An alumna of Fullerton College, VanHorn graduated with highest honors from California State University, Fullerton, earning a bachelor's degree in communications and master's degree in speech communications.

VanHorn was the first in her family to go to college and proud that all of her children, Steve, Angel and Ladonna, earned college degrees.


Tommy Reyes, Architecture and Drafting




Angelique Scheuermann, Ph.D., Chemistry

Citrus College voted region's best

The Southern California News Group's San Gabriel Valley publications presented their annual Readers Choice Awards poll, and Citrus College once again made the list. In the annual poll, readers of the San Gabriel Valley Tribune, Pasadena Star News and Whittier Daily News voted for the people, places and things they considered to be "the best of the best" in the region. During the Transfer Fairs, representatives from several University of California and California State University system campuses, as well as private universities, set up booths in the Campus Mall and answered student questions about transfer admission requirements, majors, campus life and more. For the Alma Mater Day festivities, staff wore their alma mater gear to promote transfer opportunities.



Grounds team installs drought-tolerant landscaping

Throughout the 2022-2023 academic year, Citrus College's grounds crew worked to beautify the campus. As a team, they selected and installed drought-tolerant plants, such as camphor trees, star jasmine, daylilies and iceberg roses at a variety of locations. In addition to plants, the crew installed new watering systems in each area, complete with drip tubing and regulators. As a result, less water is used, weeds are reduced, money is saved and the need for maintenance has decreased.



Campus celebrates Hispanic/Latinx events

In October 2022, Citrus College hosted a handful of events to support Hispanic Heritage Month and Undocumented Student Action Week. During Hispanic Heritage Month, the college held a game day, "paint by numbers" event and a musical performance from the Blue Note Swing Orchestra that celebrated Hispanic/ Latinx composers. For Undocumented Student Action Week, the college organized an UndocuAlly Training, "Sip-N-Paint" event, and a discussion about belonging and community building.



International students lead in **UC transfers**

Citrus College international students are transferring to University of California (UC) campuses in impressive numbers! According to a transfer data report released by the UC system in August 2022, 98 international students from Citrus College applied for fall 2021 admission and 89 received admission. With a 91% acceptance rate, Citrus College is ranked fifth in the state overall and first in the state among those community colleges with at least 50 applicants.



Transfer degree, equity progress honored

Citrus College was named both a 2022 Champion of Higher Education and an Equity Champion for Excellence in Transfer in November 2022, making us one of only three community colleges that was recognized in the Champion of Higher Education – Associate Degrees for Transfer Relative to Campus Enrollment category. In addition, Citrus College was one of six community colleges to receive the Equity Champion for Black Students designation and one of 14 community colleges to receive the Equity Champion for Latinx Students designation.



College honored for sustainability efforts

For the modernization of the Educational Development Center, Citrus College earned an Excellence in Energy and Sustainability Award from the California Community Colleges Board of Governors. Specifically, the college won Best Innovative Project for a medium-sized community college district. As a result of substantial upgrades, the building exceeds California Energy Commission standards and saves more than 170,000 kilowatt hours of energy per year. It is also engineered to be zero net energy (ZNE) ready.



Automotive program earns \$10K donation

The Greater Los Angeles New Car Dealers Association (GLANCDA) donated \$10,000 to the Citrus College Automotive Technology program in February 2023. The program used the funds to partner with Toyota T-TEN and GearWrench for the purchase of hand tools and tool boxes for two Citrus College graduates, who were employed at a GLANCDA-sanctioned dealership in the Los Angeles area. The donation was made possible by Bob Smith, GLANCDA's executive director, and Robb Hernandez, president of Camino Real Chevrolet.



Theater arts students achieve success

Two Citrus College theater arts students and one alumnus earned recognition at the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF) for region 8, which includes California, Utah, Nevada, Arizona and Hawaii. Students Carlos Medina and Peyton Johnson made it to the final round of the Irene Ryan Scholarship Competition, which awards 16 regional scholarships and two national scholarships every year. Frank Ramirez, an alumnus working toward his master in fine arts degree, won a regional scholarship and went on to receive the classical acting award at the national level.



Noncredit program launches drone technology certificate

One of Citrus College's newest noncredit certificate programs prepares students to succeed in the competitive, emerging field of drone technology. Providing students with a fundamental understanding and knowledge in unmanned aerial vehicles and unmanned aircraft systems, drone certificate curriculum includes courses in drone piloting, drone mapping, and commercial drone flight and applications in the industry. These three courses can be taken individually or together to earn a certificate.



Dental, nursing programs earn accreditation

Several Citrus College Health Sciences programs received votes of full confidence from state and national accrediting commissions. In March 2023, the college's registered dental assisting program received its national accreditation renewal, making it one of only 18 programs in the state with dual accreditation. A month later, the college's certified nursing assistant and home health aid programs received news of their accreditation renewal from the California Department of Public Health. Similarly, the registered nursing and licensed vocational nursing programs also received accreditation renewal from their respective boards.



New STEM SSOAR project debuts

A new grant from the National Science Foundation will help economically disadvantaged Citrus College students pursue their STEM goals. Project SSOAR (Student Supports Organized to Achieve Results) is designed to assist academically talented, low-income students majoring in computer science, engineering, physics or mathematics. The program will provide students with scholarship aid, STEM mentoring, support services and more. The project's first cohort of students was selected during the spring 2023 semester, and a student orientation event and growth mindset workshop were both held in March.



GradFest prepares students for commencement

To keep students on track and ready to graduate, the college connected students with key resources during the second annual GradFest in spring 2023. During the multi-day event, students purchased their cap and gown, received assistance with their graduation applications, asked counselors about degree requirements, and learned about other outstanding requirements. Many also attended the Transfer Fair to learn about the transfer process and university admission requirements.



College continues Military Friendly School streak

Citrus College did it again! For the 13th consecutive year, the college has been recognized as a Military Friendly School by VIQTORY, a service-disabled and veteranowned small business that operates the Military Friendly brand. To compile the annual Military Friendly School list, VIQTORY gathers information from data-driven surveys, public data sources and personal data collected from veterans. More than 1,800 schools participated in the 2023-2024 survey, and Citrus College was one of only 282 institutions in the nation to be granted gold status.









Campus community celebrates superintendent/president

During the spring semester, the campus community honored Dr. Greg Schulz, superintendent/president of Citrus College, by presenting him with an honorary chain of office and wearing bowties on "Dr. Schulz Day." The chain of office consisted of a medallion with the college seal, and plates containing the names of the college's former superintendent/presidents. For "Dr. Schulz Day" on April 28, staff wore bowties – a favorite of Dr. Schulz's - to honor his student-centered leadership and commitment to student success.



Writing Center celebrates 10th anniversary

To mark a decade of serving students, the Citrus College Writing Center celebrated with an event featuring live music, food and prizes. Since it launched, the Writing Center has helped students with everything from essays and research papers to lab reports and note taking. Located in the Educational Development Center, the Writing Center also provides writing workshops. Faculty may schedule in-class workshops, and students can either attend a workshop at the Writing Center or request a pre-recorded version.



Outreach program trains students to serve as official hosts

After a two-year hiatus, school relations and outreach reinstated their Student Ambassador program. A select group of students who represent the college in a variety of activities, student ambassadors are referred to as the "official hosts of the college." They are tasked with leading campus tours, assisting with hospitality activities, making classroom presentations, staffing the Student Services Building help desk and more. To become a student ambassador, students must learn specifics about the college and undergo customer service training.



Commencement celebrates student achievement

Citrus College held its 107th annual commencement ceremony on June 16 in the Citrus Stadium. For the Class of 2023, the college awarded associate degrees to 1,351 students, including 1,032 associate degrees for transfer. Additionally, 431 graduates received multiple degrees. The top five majors were business administration, psychology, pre-allied health, sociology and administration of justice/criminal justice. The diverse graduating class included students 19 to 74 years old, including 36 student veterans and 621 students graduating with honors.






