





True to its legacy, in 2013-2014 Citrus College continued to receive honors and accolades as a top associate degree producer for its outstanding academic and student support programs among the nation's 1,123 community colleges.

The college was proud to be among *Community College Week's* "Top 100 Producers" list for 2014. The college placed among the nation's leading community colleges in awarding associate degrees in the Minority Students, Asian-American Students, and Hispanic Students categories. In addition, Citrus College ranked among the nation's top 100 community colleges for conferring associate degrees in the Multi/Interdisciplinary Studies and the Parks/Recreation/Leisure/Fitness Studies categories.

For the seventh consecutive year, Citrus College was named one of the nation's "Top 50 Community Colleges" by *The Hispanic Outlook for Higher Education*. The institution was ranked 27th in the number of associate degrees awarded to Hispanic students and 46th in full-time enrollment among Hispanic students.

The college was one of only 150 community colleges in the U.S. selected by the Aspen Institute's College Excellence Program to compete for the prestigious Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence. Based on its exceptional outcomes in the areas of student access, success, and completion, Citrus College was one of 50 institutions that advanced to the second round of the competition.

Citrus College's nationally acclaimed Veterans Program was recognized as a Military Friendly School ® for the fourth consecutive year.

At the state level, The Public Policy Institute of California named Citrus College the state's third leading community college in awarding associate degrees for transfer. This accomplishment reflected the diligence of college faculty and staff in developing the transfer degree programs and guiding students to transfer into the California State University system.

In spring 2014, Citrus College was voted "Best Community College" in a survey of 28,000 San Gabriel Valley Tribune, Pasadena Star-News, and Whittier Daily News readers. This honor was announced in the annual Readers' Choice Awards Magazine.

Advances in Institutional Excellence Foster College Completion




The 2013-2014 academic year began with an enrollment of more than 13,500 students on the first day of classes—a 13 percent increase over the previous year and the highest student enrollment in three years. The passage of Proposition 30 in November 2012 enabled the college to add more than 200 class sections to the fall schedule. Citrus College was also one of only 24 California community colleges to offer a winter session, providing additional opportunities for students to complete their college education in a timelier manner.

The college also launched the process of reaffirming its accreditation. Under the leadership of accreditation co-chairs Dr. Arvid Spor, vice president of student services/interim vice president of academic affairs and Ms. Roberta Eisel, language arts faculty, teams representing students, faculty, staff and board members began to write the college's Self Evaluation Report. The Self Evaluation Report is a comprehensive analysis of the institution's programs and services as they align with the standards set by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (ACCJC/WASC). The college will submit the Self Evaluation Report to ACCJC/WASC in summer 2015, beginning the reaffirmation process that includes a site visit from an accreditation team in fall 2015.

Citrus College ended the 2013-2014 academic year on a celebratory and record-breaking note. During the 98th Commencement in June, the college conferred an unprecedented 2,119 associate degrees, breaking its record for the fourth consecutive year. In addition, 442 Associate Degrees for Transfer (AD-T) were awarded, securing the college's position among the top three California community colleges granting AD-T's, and first place in the state for conferring nearly 400 Associate in Science Degrees for Transfer.



Citrus College celebrated its 98th Commencement on June 14, 2014. More than 2,100 degrees were conferred, an all-time record for the fourth consecutive year.

The logo was displayed on college materials and publications throughout the 2014–2015 Centennial academic year.



Innovative Academic Programs Provide Opportunities to Succeed



FACULTY SABBATICALS ENHANCE LEARNING STRATEGIES

Citrus College's faculty sabbaticals allow instructors a semester away from teaching to conduct research and develop curricula that enhances learning. Upon their return to the college, the instructors present their projects and findings at a collegewide forum.

In spring 2014, two Citrus College instructors, Dyane Duffy, fine arts and Carsten Dau, language arts, gave presentations of their fall 2013 sabbaticals to the college community. Duffy researched new art techniques and pedagogies that resulted in two new art classes and a Citrus College alumni art exhibition. Dau created a program where Citrus College students enrolled in transfer level composition courses and interacted with students taking similar courses at San Diego State University and Cal Poly, Pomona.

Citrus College introduced a new interdisciplinary program, the Research in Science & Engineering Program (RISE). This program allows automotive technology and recording technology students to collaborate with science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) students through participation in research and academic competitions.

Twenty-two students representing the three disciplines formed specialized groups: the Citrus Automotive and Physics Eco-marathon, or CAPE Owls; the Space Owls; and the Rocket Owls. Lucia Riderer, physics instructor; Mario Rubio, automotive technology instructor; and Tim Jaquette, recording arts supervisor, led the teams to great success.

The CAPE Owls competed against 126 college student teams at the Shell Eco-marathon Challenge in Houston, Texas in spring 2014. They built and tested a vehicle to determine how far it could run using the least amount of energy. The CAPE Owls finished in 27th place out of the 41 teams that competed in their category.

The Rocket Owls competed in the 2014 NASA Student Launch Project. The national competition requires students to design, construct, and successfully launch a high-power rocket to an altitude determined by NASA. The rocket is required to carry at least two payloads or vehicle components that support the Space Launch System.

The Space Owls, who are students enrolled in Citrus College's physics and recording technology programs, are planning to visit Alaska in 2015 to launch a weather balloon into the Earth's atmosphere and record sounds reportedly emitted by the aurora borealis. The students are currently conducting experiments in preparation for the launch.

In addition to their research projects, the RISE Program students participated in STEM outreach programs with local elementary and middle school students.

2014 Distinguished Faculty: Dr. David Kary



Dr. David Kary has turned his lifelong interest in astronomy into a distinguished career in education.

Kary, who received Citrus College's highest faculty honor at the 2014 Commencement ceremony, developed an affinity for astronomy as a third grade student in New Westminster, British Columbia. Throughout his education, he pursued his passion for the subject and followed a career path that ultimately led him to Citrus College. He has been a full-time astronomy instructor since 1999.

The 2014 Distinguished Faculty honoree is an alumnus of the University of British Columbia. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in astronomy and geophysics, with an emphasis on the Galilean moons of Jupiter. Kary also holds a Ph.D. in astrophysics from the State University of New York at Stony Brook, where he studied and researched the formation of solar systems.

After earning his doctorate, Kary taught at the University of California, Santa Barbara. He continued to pursue his research interests and was director of the astronomy program at the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History.

Kary has stated that throughout his career, he and his colleagues have incorporated "critical thinking, hands-on experiments and observations, and interaction" in the classroom. In addition to teaching astronomy, Kary is actively involved in Citrus College governance. He has served on numerous committees, including the Curriculum Committee and the Faculty Technology Committee, both of which he chaired.

Summer Programs Provide Recreational and Academic Enrichment for Local Students

During the summer months, elementary and middle school students from the Citrus Community College District cities of Azusa, Claremont, Duarte, Glendora, and Monrovia come to the college and develop athletic skills, encounter the sciences, and prepare for academic success through their participation in the college's summer enrichment programs and 2013 was no exception.

The Kinesiology, Health, and Athletics Division hosted numerous youth sports camps. Elementary and middle school students learned new athletic and fitness skills through volleyball, soccer, swimming, tennis, football, basketball, kickball, and other recreational activities.

In addition, the college's RACE to STEM Program offered the Secrets of Science Summer Camp. The camp sparked middle school students' enthusiasm for science through interactive labs featuring topics such as crime scene investigation and biochemistry. Meanwhile, the Pre-algebra, Algebra, Geometry Enrichment (PAGE) Program reinforced students' current math knowledge and introduced new concepts that they would encounter during the next school year.

The Career Technical Program presented the Automotive Physics Engineering Experience (APEX), which helped middle school students meet the state's math and science standards using an automotive engineering curriculum. Students participated in foundational theory classes, completed hands-on labs, and constructed Go-Karts.

The Tech Girls Engage Empower Experience (TGE3), offered instruction and encouragement to middle school girls that will lead to their success in the areas of information technology, computer science, and engineering. The students engaged in activities that included robotics, web development, scientific inquiry, and technical writing.

These summer programs are instrumental in fostering a college-going culture among local K-12 students, while raising awareness of Citrus College's programs and services in the communities it serves.

Students Recognized for Academic Achievements



Whether they are members of nationally-known honor societies or involved in one of the college's 15 intercollegiate sports, Citrus College students are recognized for their scholastic achievements by regional and national organizations.

During the spring of 2014, Citrus College's Beta Nu Eta chapter of the Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society (PTK) hosted their fellow members from California and Nevada at the PTK regional convention. During the convention, held at Cal Poly Pomona, Dr. Rod A. Risley, a member of the PTK executive board, commended Beta Nu Eta for its success in advancing the national college completion initiative. He also encouraged other chapters to follow Citrus College's model for completion success.

Members of Citrus College's Fighting Owls athletics teams also received accolades for their academic achievements. More than 100 student athletes, known as the Scholar-Ballers®, were recognized for earning a GPA of 3.0 or higher during the 2013-2014 season. The students, who represented every Citrus College athletic team, were the largest group of Citrus College athletes to earn the honor since the college adopted the program in 2006.

The PTK Honor Society and the Scholar-Ballers represent a diverse group of student achievers who embody Citrus College's completion culture.



Public officials and organizations representing the cities and communities served by Citrus College have recognized Dr. Geraldine M. Perri's contributions to Citrus College since she took the helm as its superintendent/president in 2008. During her tenure at the college, Dr. Perri's honors have included the 27th Congressional District Educator of the Year, YWCA Woman of Achievement, and Duarte Educational Foundation Community Dignitary awards.

In December 2014, Cuyamaca College, where Dr. Perri served as president for six years, honored her legacy during a special ceremony held at the college's San Diego campus. She joined two former Cuyamaca College presidents at a portrait unveiling ceremony and reception where they were commended for their contributions to the growth and success of the institution. Dr. Perri also received commendations from San Diego County elected officials, including the San Diego County Board of Supervisors who declared December 8, 2014 as "Geraldine Perri, Ph.D. Day."

As Cuyamaca College's fourth president, Dr. Perri led the institution during an extraordinary time of growth and change. Cuyamaca College was recognized twice as one of the fastest-growing community colleges in the nation, achieving 7th place and 16th place rankings. Dr. Perri also led Cuyamaca College in implementing a building campaign after voters passed Proposition R, a \$207 million bond measure that provided a renovated Automotive Technology facility and a new Science and Technology Center, Student Center, and Communications Arts facility. Under Dr. Perri's leadership, the college adopted the "The Cuyamaca Way," a catchword that defined the institution's student-centered culture.

K-14 Education Forum Creates a Blueprint for College Success



K-14 Education Forum: Strategies for College Success



The roundtable discussions held at the K-14 Education Forum produced strategies designed to prepare K-12 students for college success. They included:

- Align curriculum between K-12 unified school districts and Citrus College
- Continue with math in the junior and senior years of high school
- Involve business and industry leaders in providing articulation guidelines and internships
- Create a "college-going" mindset in the early years
- Involve parents in helping prepare their children to go to college

In May 2014, Citrus College hosted local school board members, superintendents, and administrators at a K-14 Education Forum. The visiting educators represented the Azusa, Claremont, Duarte, Glendora, and Monrovia unified school districts, which are served by the college.

The purpose of the forum was to share information and develop ideas on ways to improve students' academic skills so they are prepared for post-secondary education and job opportunities.

Citrus College Superintendent/President Geraldine M. Perri, Ph.D. opened the forum summarizing the theme of the event, "Integrating K-12 and Citrus College Curriculum to Support College Readiness and Completion." Citing the challenge issued by President Barack Obama in 2010 to increase the nation's college graduation rates by 2020, Dr. Perri presented data that starkly illustrated the need to prepare students for college-level work before they enter college.

Nancy S. Brownell, the California Department of Education's Senior Fellow for Common Core Systems Implementation, and Coleen Maldonado, consultant to the K-16 School-College Partnership, were the forum's guest speakers. Both speakers acknowledged the importance of viable, long-term alliances between K-12 school districts and community colleges that involve discipline-specific partnerships, faculty-to-faculty articulation, and joint professional development activities.

After the keynote remarks, the K-12 guests joined Citrus College board members, administrators and faculty for a series of roundtable discussions. The groups brainstormed strategies to answer the forum's signature question: "Why do so many high school graduates enter college unprepared for college-level coursework?"
