Building a Better Campus

For anyone driving past Citrus College these days, it is difficult to miss the various construction projects on campus. Citrus staff sometimes receive inquiries from concerned citizens wondering how these projects are being funded during the current economic climate of budget cuts. Back in March 2004, local residents voted in favor of Measure G, a \$121 million facilities bond to update the Citrus College campus to meet the needs of students in the decades ahead. Here is an update of the new construction and remodel projects funded by Measure G.

Administration Building

Remodeling is anticipated to begin spring of 2011. The elevators will be upgraded to better accommodate wheelchairs. The entrance to the building will be relocated from the center to the east end.

Fine Arts Building

Construction is scheduled to begin spring 2011. The Fine Arts Building will house the fine arts, communications and photography programs. In addition to classrooms and faculty offices, the building will also include an art gallery and a lecture hall.

Main Gym Remodel

Construction is in process and completion is scheduled for fall 2010. The gym remodel will include new locker rooms, team rooms and a training room.

Campus Safety Building

The Campus Safety staff moved into the new facility on June 1. The new location provides directions and maps, one-day parking permits and campus information.

Student Services

The new Student Services Building is the most prominent project under construction. Visible from Citrus Avenue, this new facility will house student programs such as Admissions and Records, the EOP&S and DSP&S programs, Counseling, Financial Aid, Student Employment Services, the Career/Transfer Center, the Learning Center, and the International Students Program. The building will also feature a bookstore, cyber café and art store, and meeting rooms. Project completion is projected for fall 2010, with department move-ins to occur in stages.

Technology Engineering (Tech E) and Technician Development (Tech D) (Formerly the Vocational Technology Building)

This state-of-the-art facility is the newest addition to campus featuring an auto training center, facilities for the Administration of Justice Program, classrooms, offices, and transmission, engine and vehicle dynamometer rooms. The building was dedicated on Tuesday, September 14. (Note: This building is state funded.)

East Campus - Public Restrooms

The architect is currently working on construction plans for a new public restroom building to be located adjacent to the main gym area.

haron Lewis grew up in Glendora when it was a tiny, closeknit community of 2,500 people tucked in among the orange groves at the base of the foothills. People never locked their doors and children rode bikes together from morning until dusk through neighborhoods where they felt safe and cared for.

"It was an innocent time, very familyoriented," Lewis recalled. "Children had
a wonderful sense of freedom and security. Your friends' parents treated you
like their own children. There was no TV
so we went out and did things. As teenagers, we went to this place called the
Cougar's Den that had a jukebox and a
pool table. On Friday nights, we would
roller skate in the basement of a church
on the corner of Glendora and Bennett
Avenues. During the summer, we would
pay a dime to swim in the Citrus pool."

It was this positive upbringing and strong sense of community that has motivated Lewis throughout her lifetime to give back.

"Glendora is still a wonderful town," Lewis said. "Volunteering makes it a better place. I tell others that the reward is far greater than what you give." Lewis' commitment to community service was recently celebrated as more than 200 family, friends and civic leaders gathered together at the Glendora Country Club for a banquet in her honor hosted by the Glendora Chamber of Commerce. Lewis was named 2009 Citizen of the Year.

"I was overwhelmed," Lewis exclaimed.
"It was so beautifully done. The banquet was designed around my theme, *Giving a little time each day is my way.*"

From the fancy chocolate desserts that resembled clock faces to the colorful flower arrangements on each table, Lewis can recall every detail of the special event. Her fondest memory of all was the high school friends who came to show their support and love.

"These were friends from Citrus Union High School," Lewis said. "That means we have had 67 years of friendship and I think that is very special."

It was a friend she met later in life at a local hair salon, Ida Fracasse, and Ida's husband, Joe, who nominated Lewis for Citizen of the Year. Upon their first meeting, Ida mentioned her work with the blind and asked Lewis if she would

be interested in helping her form the EYE-DAS Foundation. The rest is history. True to Lewis' giving nature, she agreed to serve on the steering committee for EYE-DAS and 10 years later continues to work with all three club chapters in Glendora, Arcadia and West Covina.

Lewis' dedication to Citrus College and its Alumni Association spans more than 50 years. She currently serves on the Citrus College Foundation Board and has been head of the Scholarship Committee since 2006. She also chaired the Citizens' Oversight Committee for the Measure G Bond fund.

Lewis and her husband of 60 years, Charles, worked together for 42 years running the family business, Lewis' Saw and Lawnmower, Inc., in Azusa. The couple has turned over the operation to their son and his family allowing Sharon even more time to serve the community.

"Volunteering should be a lifetime commitment," Lewis said. "Your children will learn by your example. If you give of yourself, they will too. If you serve, make sure it is something you can do then put your best efforts into it. The world will be a better place because of it."

"It's going to be a big party," Sharon promised prior to the event. "We are also celebrating my husband's 80th birthday."

The couple has lived in Glendora at the same address all their married life. For 42 years they worked together running their business Lewis' Saw and Lawn Mower in Azusa.

"We are partners," Sharon reflected. "We love one another and complement one another."

Is there a secret to their happy marriage?

"I tell him what to do and he does it," Sharon joked.

The truth is the busier Sharon becomes with her community service, the more she depends on Charles.

"He is like my personal secretary," Sharon admitted. "He takes my messages. Jane and Cheryl in the Citrus College Foundation even bake him cookies once in awhile for answering their phone calls."

The couple enjoys spending time with their 11 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren.

"Family is the most important thing to us," Sharon said.


7 Irene Navarro, age 20, Dr. Bill May Scholarship

Student Honors Faculty with Scholarship

Joseph Patito has a lot to look forward to these days. The Citrus College student from San Marino transfered this fall to Columbia University and realized a dream come true. This happy ending is also a new beginning for a young man who worked hard to rise above his self-imposed limitations. It took the kind words and guidance of two very special faculty members to help Patito fulfill his potential. Now he is honoring them by establishing a scholarship in their names.

"Not everyone needs academic instruction," Patito reflected. "Some people need life guidance. I was in a bad place and Citrus helped me get through that, and because of it I am stronger than ever before. Essentially, I grew up during this short year at Citrus."

Patito "grew up" enough to apply to Columbia University. *U.S. News and World Report's* Best Colleges of 2010 ranked Columbia eighth in the nation. A total of 79 of Columbia's alumni and current and former faculty have won the Nobel Prize. None of this phased Patito who admitted that just two years earlier he was "living on the couch" wasting his life.

"I heard they (Columbia) were looking for talented kids who were forgotten," Patito recalled. "I made an appointment to be interviewed by them down in Newport Beach. I brought Mr. Waddington, my mentor and honors director, in hopes that maybe our two schools could meet."

As a result of this interview, Columbia University set up a seminar on the Citrus College campus to reach bright, talented students like Patito who had somehow fallen through the cracks.


Patito flew to New York for another meeting with Columbia -- this time on their historic New York campus.

"In essence, Columbia believed in me and, in return, I was able to rise higher than I ever thought possible," Patito said.

On learning of his acceptance, Patito said, "It's surreal."

Grateful, he wants to make a difference in the lives of others.

"Millions of people like me are forgotten about daily," Patito said. "Not everyone will have the same opportunities or same ability as me. Therefore, I must take it upon myself to give back. Two years ago I had nothing and now I cannot describe how much has changed.



I was able to secure a professional job allowing me to allocate resources to the underprivileged."

Patito contacted the Citrus College Foundation to set up a scholarship named after Citrus College Spanish instructor, Dr. Elisabeth Garate, who Patito refers to as his "second mother," and Honors Program director Brian Waddington.

"Both of these professors knew me from the beginning of my struggles and kept in contact with me and encouraged me," he said. "I used to lie about who I was out of shame and now I reflect and realize I could not have made up a better story than the reality in which I now live. Because of Citrus I have all of this."

Citrus College alumnus Llewellyn Eugene (Gene) Dudley, class of 1965, was selected by the Alumni Association for the 2010 Lifetime Achievement Award. Dudley, who passed away in 2009, donated \$100,000 to the Citrus College Foundation in 2007 to fund a scholarship program for students. Each year one student who demonstrates the quality of leadership is awarded a Gene Dudley Leadership Scholarship.

At the commencement ceremony, Dudley's partner, Richard Lieboff, accepted the award on his behalf.


"I am so proud that Gene was selected for this award," Lieboff said. "His legacy will live on through his generosity. I hope he serves as an inspiration for others to follow his example and give to those less fortunate."

Dudley was inspired to make the donation to Citrus College in light of the increasing cost of higher education.

"The cost of attending college has become astronomical," he said in a 2007 interview. "I think it is important for my generation to provide some financial assistance to enable the next generation of students to go on to a four-year college or university and to achieve a degree if they so desire."

As a student at Citrus College,
Dudley played an active role on
campus. His involvement included
serving as student body president,
commissioner of student activities
and as a member of the Student
Court, establishing a campus service organization, and contributing
articles and writing a regular column
for the Citrus College *Clarion* student
newspaper.

"I want to encourage others to consider becoming actively engaged in campus life," he said. "The benefits

and personal growth opportunities for the individual, in my opinion, far outweigh the time and effort that participation in campus life necessitates."

Although Dudley left the majority of the selection specifics up to the Foundation's Scholarship Committee, he did have some general criteria that recipients should meet.

"I would like the student to have a 3.0 grade point average or higher and to have actively participated in the campus life of Citrus College; including, but not necessarily limited to, involvement in service organizations and/or student government," he said.

Dudley also designated that the scholarship recipient be a student who was transferring to a four-year school.

"I chose transferring students as the recipient category because the cost of higher education at a four-year college or university can be quite intimidating," he said. "There are, doubtless, many Citrus students who confront the high cost of upper division undergraduate study as they prepare to transfer to a four-year college or university. I am hopeful that my scholarship will assist at least one person, each year, to ease a bit of the financial burden they will be facing."

Dudley himself was a transfer student. After graduating from Glendora High School in 1963, he enrolled at Citrus College. Upon receiving his associate degree in social sciences from Citrus in 1965, Dudley transferred to the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA).

"I, like many others, did not grow up in affluence and Citrus College provided

me with an affordable opportunity to begin my college career," he said. "I think my first two years of college at Citrus prepared me academically to move on to UCLA for my upper division undergraduate study."

After earning his bachelor's degree in political science at UCLA in 1967, Dudley went on to attend graduate school at California State University, Hayward and California State University, Los Angeles where he majored in public administration.

In 2004, Dudley retired from the City of Los Angeles after 24 years of employment.

"During those 24 years, I worked in several city departments including Aging, Community Development, Housing, and Recreation and Parks," he said. "My final position with the city was as director of real estate and asset management for Recreation and Parks."

After retiring, Dudley entered the real estate industry, working as an agent in Glendale from 2005-2006. He retired from real estate in January of 2007 and presented the Citrus College Foundation with the \$100,000 endowment that summer.

"Citrus College has always held a special place in my heart," he said. "I am hoping that my scholarship, to some extent, will help another Citrus College student achieve his or her dream."

Dudley also made large contributions to other organizations dear to him including the Los Angeles Zoo and the Coalition for Pulmonary Fibrosis, to help raise awareness and one day find a cure for the disease that took his life.

Bob Margett Foundation Gift Establishes Book Reserve Program

A gift of \$10,000 from the Bob Margett Foundation makes textbooks available to Citrus students who may not have the finances to purchase them. With help from a matching funds campaign, the donation establishes the Bob Margett Book Reserve Fund on campus.

"We often hear of students who have dropped their classes or arrive to class unprepared for instruction because they cannot afford to buy the required materials," said Dr. Geraldine M. Perri, Citrus College superintendent/president. "By making textbooks readily available for various written and reading assignments, we are eliminating a major barrier that students face."

A committee, which includes members of the Associated Students of Citrus College Executive Board, decides which classes and/or programs would benefit most from the reserve. Once these classes and programs are identified, the Citrus College bookstore ensures that the necessary textbooks are purchased at a competitive price and that a buyback process is in place when new editions are released.

Senator Margett says not only is he happy to be part of the book reserve program, but he is especially pleased with the fact that community members have the opportunity to become involved.

"The matching fund will allow the community to participate in assisting students in reaching their educational goals and support Citrus College's mission," he said.
